In welcoming you to the annual report of Parkinson's Queensland Incorporated for 2017-2018, three themes sum up the past year from my perspective as President of the Management Committee:

1. Building Sustainability and Longevity as an organisation
2. Ensuring Accountability and Good Governance into the future
3. Developing a platform to provide the best benefits for those people touched by Parkinson's

As the peak body for PLWP in Queensland we want to deliver for the over 10,000 Queenslanders living with a diagnosis and the ten-fold more who are directly impacted. To do this one of PQI's goals is to reach many more of our constituents and to strive to have a trusted voice that is listened to by the decision makers in our community, whose actions can have direct impact on the quality of life for PLWP. I want people to get involved with PQI not just to receive some direct benefit from the experience, but instead, to provide their support for our Parkinson's community and to help our organisation be more influential. Numbers certainly talk, and a particular goal for us is to increase the size of our organisation and to make sure it is sustainable for the long term. We must always remember our history as a grass-roots organisation, but also have a vision to really make a difference at all levels. This year your Management Committee has been putting considerable thinking into how PQI might reach out to more in our community. We are looking to the future and to how we can ensure we stay relevant and effective. None of this would be possible without good governance and an organisational structure that supports professionalism and accountability. A sub-committee of the Management Committee have been reviewing the constitution of the organisation and we will be looking at whether some minor changes might benefit these objectives. This will be something to consider over the next twelve months.

By all measures, PQI has had an excellent year. It is a complex and challenging job and, despite the small numbers in our office team, we continue to punch well above our weight in what we can deliver in terms of information and support. We are also maintaining a solid financial position in a time which is not all smooth sailing for not-for-profits. This is not just by lucky chance, but due in no small part to the vision, dedication and prudence our CEO, Mark Hindle, and our dedicated office team who greatly support our role as

a Management Committee. Great educational events were held in Cairns and Townsville, demonstrating our commitment to regional as well as metropolitan Queensland. Our Cambodian Cycle Odyssey was a fantastic first foray into a new fund-raising initiative for PQI. We have rolled out funding opportunities for support group members, allied health professionals and researchers as a means to enhance our impact. PQI continues to provide leadership in our national federation of Parkinson's organisations, always with a view to collaboration rather than competition.

I want to thank you all for supporting PQI over the past year. I also want to particularly acknowledge the members of our Management Committee and thank them for volunteering their time and expertise in such a professional way over the past year. Together, we really can make a difference.

What a year it has been.

So much happening and so much achieved that benefits all Queenslanders living with Parkinson's.

Parkinson's Queensland's efforts to improve its awareness levels increases through educational programs, support group visits and educational forums have been improving. It had been its serious intent to ensure its programs were widely offered and open to all people affected by Parkinson's. At times, that stance has impacted our ability to secure sponsorship and other funding for the programs as many of the traditional supporters, such as pharmaceutical companies, have shifted away from sponsorship and advertising. As a consequence, PQI has had to rely upon operational fundraising and grants. That is never an easy position particularly in a tight and competitive funding market.

Among the programs offered have been; the GEOPD 2017 consortium held in Cairns in October in tandem with a Health Professionals Symposium and a half day forum for Support Groups and members. In addition a highly successful Forum in Townsville addressing the issues of being newly diagnosed with Parkinson's. Our speakers were of a high calibre and this aided in attracting a good level of delegates to our programs.

In October 2017 Parkinson's Queensland undertook its first ever adventure fundraising and awareness

program. Led by Rachel Jeffrey, a team of members, people with Parkinson's, a Management Committee member, 'PJ' Byrne, cycled through Cambodia. Their effort, the forerunner to others, raised in excess of \$50,000 while bringing awareness of Parkinson's not

only to the Cambodian communities but also to those of us at home.

A Walk In The Park was held but failed to deliver to the levels of expectation and is to be reviewed before conducting another in April 2019 in concert with World Parkinson's Day activities in April.

Our staff numbers were diluted with the departure of two team members at a critical time for PQI's activities impinging upon our communications, marketing and fundraising activities. At the date of this publication we have yet to recruit replacement team members although it is recognised there is an urgent need to increase our communications activities.

It says a great deal for the tenacity and commitment of our small team of **Brikena Mema, Rachel Jeffrey** and **Fiona Webb** that PQI has been able to deliver such high quality programs. They have continually performed above expectations.

I am proud of each team member and commend their commitment and loyalty during a year.

During the year, your Management Committee agreed to invest in the implementation of a new member/donor database system, known as ThankQ. All of our team members are being trained on its operation which will see more effective event and fundraising as well as membership and support group management. As with all new technology, coming to grips is not an overnight proposition but already we are seeing significant benefits in how we manage our membership records, support group activities and third party fundraising events. The big trial will be 'A Walk In The Park 2019' but with the efforts of our team we are confident members will notice a huge difference in the service provided.

As part of PQI's strategic plan for 2016-2020 has been the introduction of a new website which is intended to enable members to activate directly for membership renewals, event registrations, donations and our educational forums. As with the database system this will take some months to complete as a project. It is better for PQI to proceed deliberately

and to ensure it is operationally effective before going live. In the meantime, PQI will use a combination of its existing website and the ThankQ system for day to day operations.

It is now important for PQI to push forward with its strategic plans and recruitment of new team members will be our focus.

In the year ahead our team will be directly involved in the delivery of new educational forums firstly on the Gold Coast and hinterland area in 2019 and later in regional areas. A Support Group Coordinators' Forum will be delivered. PQI will lead nationally as it prepares with Parkinson's Australia for the World Parkinson's Congress in Kyoto, Japan, during June 2019.

A source of pride for the whole team and your Management Committee has been the commitment to delivering educational as well as travel and conference awards for nurses, allied health professionals, members, support group coordinators and carers. With the previous major research commitment to Griffith Institute for Drug Discovery in partnership with the Agieum Foundation and the University, about to run out it is our intent to find other appropriately co-funded research projects. It is important for Parkinson's Queensland Inc. to be seen to be in the vanguard of research funding.

As this Annual General Meeting concludes, I will have served three years as your Chief Executive Officer; something of which I am very proud. I pay tribute to and thank all the many PQI members, Support Groups, our team and Management Committee for their continued support as we steadfastly held the strategic ground to the benefit of people affected by Parkinson's. Thank you all.

It is my hope that the year ahead will be a great success for all associated with Parkinson's Queensland Inc.



# Strategic Review 2018-2020

In August 2016 following an externally facilitated workshop, Parkinson's Queensland's Management Committee implemented its Strategic Plan 2016-2020. Since then the directions the plan laid down with some reasonable success have guided our organisation.

**As with all such strategic plans, it is vital they are reviewed, invigorated and where necessary changed to meet the conditions applying subsequently. Therefore, it was in May 2018 when the full Management Committee and our team members met in Brisbane to review the plan over a full day. 2016 - Joining forces with other neurological charities, Parkinson's Queensland invested in the launch of the **SPARK Neurocare Network** and, then together with Parkinson's Australia began to campaign governments to 'Make Parkinson's A Priority'.



**Throughout the year several activities took place over and above the routine for Parkinson's Queensland's team. Some of these will be the forerunner to expanding programs and community events into the future.**

## Science Conquering Parkinson's

It was a great honour to host the recent *12th Annual Meeting of the Genetic Epidemiology of Parkinson's Disease (GEOPD) Consortium* in Cairns as part of the three-day, three-part 'Expanding: Science Conquering Parkinson's' event during October. This global consortium of researchers and scientists, dedicated to promoting education, scientific research and further development in Parkinson's disease arrived in Cairns from around Australia and six continents. Many researchers showcased their work through 'poster presentations' and during breaks were able to speak to other researchers, scientists and health professionals about these posters. To have such eminent scientists presenting in Australia was a great compliment to scientific researchers in our country.



A full day *Health Professionals Symposium* was held on the Friday with Australia's leading specialists, nurses, allied health professionals and leading pharmaceutical suppliers in attendance. Speakers at the Symposium included *Prof. Christine Klein (Leubeck), Prof. Rejiko Krueger (Luxembourg), Prof. Colin Masters MD (Melbourne), Prof. Ashley Bush (Melbourne), Prof. Peter Silburn AM (Brisbane), Assoc. Prof. Antony Cooper (Sydney), Assoc. Prof. Rohan Teasdale (Brisbane), Dr Jake Graten (Brisbane), and Dr Richard Wyse (United Kingdom).*

A special addition to the Symposium program was the *James Parkinson Bicentenary Oration*, 'Parkinson's Disease - Personalised, precision medicine from 20 years of genetic insight,' which was presented by *Prof. Matthew Farrer PhD (University of British Columbia)*. The Symposium was followed by a half day *Forum program specifically for members and Support Groups* and all people affected by Parkinson's. We enjoyed welcoming the scientists, health professionals and people with Parkinson's from around Australia, and the world, to Expanding Possibilities 2017.

As we say at Parkinson's Queensland, *"we are all in this together."*

## A Walk In The Park 2017

The 2017 A Walk in the Park (AWITP) was a successful event for those who participated. There were 360 participants across Queensland, but these fell well short of expectations. Despite some early struggles, a surplus of \$27,485 was achieved. A summary of participant engagement across three sites is as follows:

Of the 360 participants, 154 (43%) had previously participated in Walks. That is encouraging given the event was not held in 2016. AWITP is intended to promote awareness and support for people with Parkinson's.

A Walk in the Park is a program that has over the years become less relevant than in its early iterations. There is a lack of clarity around its purpose and effectiveness. As PQI is aware of a national review of the program by the CEO's of each State this review document offers the following considerations to the debate: the event could be an awareness project aimed at involving the whole community and not only people affected by Parkinson's; but, there should be a strong fundraising aspect to its implementation; an external event coordinator should be engaged to run the event; that consideration of timing to align with other states should be resolved before proceeding.

A Walk in the Park is scheduled to be held in April 2019.



**2016 - Contributed \$150,000 along with two other co-funders in support of research undertaken at the Griffith Institute for Drug Discovery (GRIDD) into identifying people susceptible to Parkinson's and what precedes the disease.**



It can be daunting when you are newly diagnosed with Parkinson's disease (PD).

With that in mind that the *Townsville Parkinson's Support Group*, led by Management Committee Member, Ruth Coleman, hosted a '*Newly Diagnosed Forum*' to bring together those in the region who wanted to learn more about their condition and to find support from the local network of champions who live with Parkinson's every day.

The Forum, facilitated by PQI President, *Prof George Mellick*, called on the experience and qualifications of some of Australia's leaders in Parkinson's to deliver up to date information, research and advice for those who are newly diagnosed, their family, carers, friends and health professionals.

The panel of speakers included *Karen O'Maley RN*, Neurosciences Queensland; *Paul Parker*, Sports Med NQ; *Ann Finimore*, Speech Pathologist at the Prince Charles Hospital; *Jenny Potter*, Carer; *Dr Richard White*, Townsville Hospital & Townsville Neurosciences Clinic and *Rachael White RN*, Townsville Neurosciences Clinic.

Over 100 people, came together to share their experiences with PD and the Newly Diagnosed Forum was fortunate to attract speakers with varied experiences from health professionals through to carers and people living with Parkinson's disease.

### Ruth Coleman sums up the forum beautifully.

*"People are hungry for information, especially when they're newly diagnosed and it is vital to give people a place to come together and connect. It's important to remember that not everyone has the internet or is technologically savvy, beyond that when you're newly diagnosed you may not even have the capacity to comprehend what the words on the page mean to you or for you, so to seek all of that information at once is invaluable. I am so proud of all speakers because they did such a great job. We incorporated movement into the program to make sure that people with Parkinson's were able to stretch their legs, which highlighted what such a long day means to someone with Parkinson's. It was nice just to be able to share the tricks I've learnt along the way that make life easier! It made me feel like I could give something back, in a similar way that people have to me over the years."*

At Parkinson's Queensland, it is our aim to work closely with all people living with Parkinson's disease; this includes GP's, Allied Health Practitioners, all levels of government, people living with Parkinson's and the people who care for them. By doing so, we broaden our knowledge of this condition which assists us to raise awareness for the condition and dispel the belief that Parkinson's is an 'old persons disease'. It is this advanced knowledge and greater connection with the Parkinson's community that enables us to encourage government representatives to enhance support and advocacy throughout the sector.

It is abundantly clear there is a lack of understanding amongst those offering health services about the real issues suffered by people living with PD, especially their Carers. By offering these forums, the gap in services is closing and it is through engagement we will be able to further enhance the projects of Parkinson's QLD to the greater Parkinson's Community.

**What's something that people would be surprised to know about you:**


I was an only child and unfortunately lost my father when I was ten years old. We never had a car but I had a bicycle which I loved. My means of transport!

2017 - PQI President, Prof George Mellick, chaired and hosted the **12th Annual Meeting of the Genetic Epidemiology of Parkinson's Consortium (GEOPD)** in Cairns. GEOPD is a global consortium of researchers dedicated to promoting education, scientific research and translational development in Parkinson's disease.



I am pleased to present the Treasurer's Report for the 2017-18 financial year which has been one of considerable investment in infrastructure, education and resources while ensuring Parkinson's Queensland Inc's (PQI) financial position remains strong and liquid.

Alongside PQI, the Parkinson's Queensland Research Fund (PQRF) account is operated specifically for research related activities. Income in PQRF is sourced largely from tied bequests and interest.

Management reporting utilising the full capacity of MYOB software has been a positive outcome for your Management Committee.

The following investment commitments were taken up in the 2017-18 financial year (source of funds in brackets):

- ThankQ CRM and Business Enhancement system (Bequest term deposits held) - \$51,494
- GEoPD2017 (PE Walshe Estate deposits held) - \$73,611
- GRIDD Research Fellow (PE Walshe Estate deposits held) - \$50,000

A continuing strong financial position is shown in the accounts, separately for PQI and PQRF, and on a consolidated basis. Both PQI and PQRF are solvent and able to meet their obligations as they fall due. Future commitments are already taken into account where appropriate.

It will be noted the provision of the GRIDD payments (\$50,000) shows as a liability in the balance sheet of PQRF. This latter amount will be extinguished in January 2019 when the final tranche is drawn.

All expenditure is channelled through the PQI Main Operational account and then adjusted as required.

From a liquidity perspective our major assets are in cash, as part of our bank accounts, or on term deposit. Income is benefitting from the retention of funds within PQRF and the receipt of bequest income. This result reflects a healthy operational result due to the windfall of bequest income.

All creditors are paid as they fall due and PQI maintains a 10-15-day payment cycle. The provisions PQI makes for preferential payments such as taxation and staff entitlements are maintained carefully and applied appropriately. Debtors are current.

Staff superannuation is up to date with no outstanding payments. Leave provisions remain high at \$26,066. Personal leave is in the main within arrangements. While

PQI has been in support of staff members in relation to entitlements it is important to ensure our staff's well-being is catered for appropriately. Withholding Tax and GST are met as payable with none outstanding.

The departure of two team members during the first quarter of 2018 restricted PQI's fundraising plans. Each departure was associated with a legal claim which was subsequently withdrawn. The impact of lost income coupled with the associated legal fees was substantial but were able to be contained within operational activities. Despite the impact of staff departures, PQI continues to maintain a strong position at financial year end.

Income received is a very good result against the annualised budget projection. Fundraising remains the key to the financial strengthening of PQI.

The impact of bequest and grant renewal has seen PQI protect its position in terms of budget projection and indications are for it to exceed budget income. The Federal grant was renegotiated and has been renewed at \$250,000 for two years maturing on 30 June 2020. Fundraising income must now increase to alleviate PQI's reliance on grants and serendipitous income from bequests.

The motor vehicle remains on the books with a written down value of \$7,250. Every effort will be made to quit the vehicle in the new financial year. Its condition and low mileage ought to realise a strong sale process with write backs required.

The acquisition of the ThankQ CRM appears for the first time in the PQI balance sheet and will have a significant impact upon the provision for depreciation in the new financial year.

All investments are held in trust at the Heritage Bank. Our approach of equity enhancement remains in force. It will be prudent to build in an expenditure plan within the 2018-19 budget projections, particularly for research.

In closing, I acknowledge the commitment and hard work displayed by the team which has contributed towards the financial security and successful operations of PQI this past year.

I am pleased to commend the Treasurer's Report and the Audited Financial accounts for the financial year ending 30 June 2018 for adoption by the members.

**NOTE 1 – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 1981 (Qld). The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historic costs and does not take into account changing money values, or except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report.

**(a) Income Tax**

No provision for income tax has been raised as Parkinson's Queensland Incorporated operates solely as a non-profit association established for the provision of community services and accordingly it is exempt from income tax under section 50-45 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

**(b) Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)**

Leasehold improvements and office equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciable amount of all PPE is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

Leasehold improvements are amortised over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

**(c) Impairment of Assets**

At the end of each reporting period, the entity reviews the carrying values of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is recognised in the income and expenditure statement.

**(d) Employee Benefits**

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee benefits have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

**(e) Cash and Cash Equivalents**

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less

**NOTE 1 – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONT.)**

**(f) Revenue and Other Income**

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising revenue.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest rate method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument.

Grant and donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

**(g) Good and Services Tax (GST)**

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the Assets and Liabilities Statement are shown inclusive of GST.


