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PRESIDENT'S REPORT



This year has been one of building and consolidation. At last year's Annual General Meeting I spoke of how Parkinson's Queensland should strive to: 1) increase its service delivery to where it has the most impact; 2) rebuild its communications with members

and stakeholders; and 3) further develop the all-important connections with its major funders, especially governments. I am delighted to say we have met these challenges head-on and are starting to get some traction in these areas. For this I am especially grateful for the commitment and professionalism shown by our Staff and your Management Committee. This is the commitment we have all given to the implementation of the Strategic Plan 2016-2020 developed early last year. While there is still much to do, we are making steady progress and moving in the right direction.

The action items of the Plan were to focus upon our 1) Operational systems; 2) Collaboration; 3) Strategic Partnerships and 4) Maintaining Sustainability all of which are being achieved.

The main challenge for us has been the finalisation of our operational systems which, to be effective must be done correctly, and that takes time and money. While most operational issues have been addressed, implemented and operate effectively, the finalisation of our Business Management system is still six months from final delivery. As this comes on line in early 2018 we will be in an excellent position to really press ahead in many areas.

Our collaborative efforts are increasing with important investments currently under consideration in the areas of telerehabilitation and educational program delivery. We are also continuing to develop our research collaborations. Our focus will be on partnering and leverage and we are already working closely with universities and other not-for-profits such as members of the SPARK Neurocare Network, Wesley Private Hospital Foundation and the Aegium Foundation. Moreover, we are engaged and committed to working with our sister Parkinson's organisations around Australia and the Parkinson's Australia Federation. These will expand into other areas to provide on the ground support to Support Groups and all who are impacted by Parkinson's.

It is important for us to appreciate that Parkinson's Queensland cannot be all things to all people. We do have limited financial resources. While it may appear

that we have substantial funds available, we need to be prudent and resourceful. With this in mind, we have decided that it is in PQI's best interest to pursue partnerships or collaborative agreements only when there are other partners willing to provide financial commitments to the initiative. This leverage potential means that we get value for money and maximise our chances of successful outcomes. We will continue to seek out partners to engage with and will assess proposals on their merit. That involves a great deal of time and effort to achieve and I appreciate that, to some, this may appear to move too slowly. However, we cannot afford to enter into agreements on other than sound and relevant bases. Examples include the agreement between Parkinson's Queensland, Aegium Foundation, and Griffith University to fund a Senior Research Fellowship which took over six-months to complete and will be acquitted over three-years; and our discussions with the University of Queensland in relation to a telerehabilitation clinic to benefit people with Parkinson's in Regional Queensland, which has taken over nine months to date while additional partners are found. These examples, and others enhance opportunities for strategic partnerships with governments, other not-for-profits as well as businesses.

Our operational sustainability is our focus always. To achieve such, especially its delivery of programs, information, and services into Regional Queensland, we will explore alternative income streams from the traditional reliance on government funding by moving into the philanthropic arena. To this end, the Management Committee has agreed to invest in the appointment of an experienced Fundraising and Marketing Manager.

The operation of a peak association requires the passion and commitment of dedicated individuals. It is not an easy task as each has other things and business in their lives to attend to daily. I would acknowledge the dedication of my Management Committee and thank each of Prof Peter Silburn AM, Karen O'Maley RN, Paulette Montaigne, Peter Byrne, Daniel O'Sullivan and Madonna Brady for their service. Sadly, Madonna Brady resigned from the Management Committee on 28 June but her service is not diminished by her decision. It has been an honour to serve with these members who have nothing but the best for People affected by Parkinson's in their hearts always. I also thank Lesley van Schoubroeck for agreeing to serve on the Management Committee.

Our staff has been the life-blood of Parkinson's Queensland and who daily provide us inspiration at the

levels of commitment and service to our stakeholders rarely seen. Each knows how important are Parkinson's Queensland's Mission, Vision and Values and each delivers outstanding service to our Members. I am proud to acknowledge and thank each of Brikena Mema, Rachel Jeffrey, Fiona Webb, Melissa Hislop and Mark Hindle for their dedication and for treating their involvement as so much more than just a job.

Thank you for allowing me to serve as President of Parkinson's Queensland Inc. It has been an honour.

This past year has seen Parkinson's Queensland Inc continue its strong growth as it implemented the Strategic Plan 2016 – 2020. Membership has grown to a record level of 1386 members while interaction with Support Groups has increased as have program and services

delivery emphasising the importance of a strong Plan.

Having committed leadership from our Management Committee gave everyone confidence to move forward with new ideas and innovations to benefit not only our membership but all people affected by Parkinson's. Among these innovations have been the introduction of roadshows around the State following the successful trial in Ipswich in 2016. The support for such information sessions to our constituents and health professionals cannot be overstated. We have grown closer to peak bodies such as the Pharmacy Guild Queensland and Australian Neurological Nurses Association – Queensland, along with a host of allied health professionals including, Occupational Therapists, Speech Therapists, Physiotherapists, as well as neurologists and academic institutions. Each of these has led Parkinson's Queensland to collaborative opportunities where co-branded programs will become more common and accessible to all people affected by Parkinson's.

While these activities are vital we have become a victim of our success. Frustration from some members has been expressed at the pace at which the programs have been implemented. While understandable when we form strategic partnerships, they must be in the interests of all while protecting the organisation from risk.

There will be a roll-out of programs, services and

collaborative roadshows in the 2017-18 financial year. Among these will be the inclusion of a Support Group Forum with the GEOPD 2017 in Cairns, participation in a collaborative Open Day and Symposium with the Wesley Private Hospital in Brisbane and a full-day Forum in Townsville in early March 2018. Each of the projects will be set the standard for others as Parkinson's Queensland strives to achieve its goal of engaging with 80% of all people diagnosed with Parkinson's in Queensland by 2020. To achieve the latter will involve close and collaborative input from our Support Groups across the State.

Parkinson's Queensland is not South-East Queensland centric focused. That is where its current membership and Support Group membership is concentrated. That will change. Interestingly as at the end of June, the highest concentration of Support Group membership is on the Gold Coast where there are only two Support Groups. Across the State, particularly into regional areas, there will be growth and consequently more Support Groups.

The Strategic Plan 2016-2020 included as a key objective to bring Support Groups within the overall Parkinson's Queensland umbrella. That continues to be an emphasis. A great deal has been achieved in the 2016-17 year with limited resources and financial capacity to move forward at a pace members would hope. But, there is a difference between having strong financial reserves and our freedom to spend on any project that may be put forward. Most of Parkinson's Queensland's cash reserves are tied in that they can only be applied to research related activities. In the year ahead, members will see an increase in the level of untied funding which will see the organisation increase its activity towards attracting philanthropic support while providing a buffer to diminishing government funding.

Our staff consistently delivers above expectations. Through a policy of mutual support and on the job training supplemented by professional development our team has performed extraordinarily well. As Chief Executive Officer I could not be prouder. Thank you to Brikena Mema, Rachel Jeffrey, Fiona Webb and Melissa Hislop.

I also thank the Management Committee under the leadership of Professor George Mellick, for its support, faith and commitment.

Parkinson's Queensland's origins began in 1982 when a group of multidisciplinary professionals working with people with Parkinson's recognised that their clients needed more from their health care than what was being provided.

Following initial discussions, the group consulted with the Parkinson's Society of New South Wales, and subsequently held a public seminar in 1983, to determine the level of public support and if further action should be undertaken.

WHO WE ARE

Since 1985, Parkinson's Queensland has helped thousands of Queenslanders in their journey with Parkinson's, not only in the early stages after diagnosis, but throughout the condition's progression.

Parkinson's Queensland is a charitable organisation that provides individuals, families and the health, aged and disability sectors with information, support and education. We also help fund research into a cure for Parkinson's and improved quality of life.

We provide an essential link between the community and support services to ensure those living with the day-to-day and long term challenge of Parkinson's can face the future with confidence and independence.

WHAT WE DO

Parkinson's Queensland provides information, education, encouragement and support to people living with Parkinson's disease, their families and carers. Our organisation works to create better awareness about the disease among health professionals and community workers as well as the general public.

Parkinson's Queensland also provides information sheets and other resources including a lending library addressing various aspects of the disease.

Parkinson's Queensland advocates to all levels of government for better services and treatments for people impacted by Parkinson's and related disorders.

Parkinson's Queensland can assist with referral and access to various health professionals, services and networks.

Parkinson's Queensland is proud to provide the following services:

- Support and information for people with Parkinson's, their carers, family and friends
- A network of 39 Support Groups
- Printed literature on new medications and possible drug interactions
- The Parkinson's Queensland Connections magazine
- A library and resource centre with online catalogue and mail-out service
- Seminars for people with Parkinson's and their families
- Free call number (includes country callers) – 1800 644 189
- Educational services for health professionals and community groups
- Funding for and co-operation in local Parkinson's research
- Training and Education sessions at designated venues throughout the State (open to all persons, community services, organisations, staff, residential/hostel care staff, allied health professionals, volunteers etc.)

Parkinson's is a progressive neurological condition that affects people from all walks of life. It is quite common, with approximately 80,000 Australians, including over 17,000 Queenslanders living with Parkinson's.

The average age of diagnosis is 65 years, however younger people can be diagnosed with Parkinson's too. This is referred to as Young Onset Parkinson's.

It is not easy to diagnose Parkinson's. There are no laboratory tests (such as a blood test or brain scan), so it is important that the diagnosis is made by a specialist, such as a neurologist. The specialist will examine for any physical signs of Parkinson's and take a detailed history of symptoms.

- Referral (Incoming/Outgoing), advocacy and support.

STRATEGIC DIRECTION

At the October 2016 *Annual General Meeting*, Parkinson's Queensland unveiled its *Strategic Plan for 2016 – 2020*, which was well received by the members and guests in attendance.

The Parkinson's Queensland Strategic Plan outlines the 4 key initiatives of the organisation:

1. Develop our governance and leadership
2. Strengthen our operations
3. Enhance our strategic relationships
4. Ensure sustainability

Of particular importance and relevance to the strategy over the next four years is the importance of reaching the 17,000 diagnosed with Parkinson's in Queensland. There is a great need for our services in the wider regions of Queensland and this Strategic Plan sets out to improve that for the betterment of people with Parkinson's all across the State.

Together, we shall push forwards, into a better, brighter and more impactful future.

The organisation changed its name to Parkinson's Queensland Incorporated (PQI) in May 1996 and adopted the internationally recognised Parkinson's flower, the Tulip, as part of its original multi-coloured branding.



INFO LINE

The Info Line is the first point of contact for many people living with Parkinson's. Our Info Line provides information about Parkinson's disease and related disorders, including but not limited to; newly diagnosed, hospital stays, travel options, home care services, government services and subsidies, education, unbiased referrals to neurologists, doctors, allied health professionals, other services, general enquiries or simply a friendly and understanding voice on the end of the phone. Calls are varied and include options for carer and family support particularly with regard to referral options offered.

There are requests for information on research, medications, community services, aids and equipment, exercise groups, health professionals, counselling, Support Group contacts, events and changes to the health care system.

Calls can remain anonymous if the caller prefers and our support staff are prepared to provide information about Parkinson's disease and related disorders.

Each and every call is important to us.

The Info Line received 1074 calls via the 1800 number and a further 500 via our land line from 1st July 2016 - 30th June 2017.

ADVOCACY

As the peak state-wide agency, we represent the needs and interests of people with Parkinson's to all levels of government, seeking improved funding for services, research and awareness. We are also represented as part of the national peak body, *Parkinson's Australia*, and network as a member of neurological service organisations in Queensland.

RESOURCES

Many resources are available, including information sheets, brochures, practitioner booklets, information kits, books, journal articles, and DVD's through our library. These materials which are sent to enquirers help with understanding diagnosis, changes in symptoms and strategies to live well with Parkinson's.

Additionally, our website has information for people with Parkinson's, carers, and health professionals, and our Connections Magazine is distributed to our members.

SUPPORT GROUPS

Support Groups provide a warm and welcoming place for people with Parkinson's, their carers, families and friends to come and share experiences, friendship, peer support and information. At the conclusion of the 2017 financial year, Parkinson's Queensland had 39 Support Groups state-wide.

Support Group meetings are run by volunteer coordinators who may include practical tips and advice, group discussions, social outings and education sessions from health professionals.

Support Groups meet regularly, often with a guest speaker or round table discussion on a particular topic. Support Groups also partake in social activities such as morning teas, lunches and other outings.

Parkinson's Queensland supports the groups through resources, teleconferencing, administration support and networking for the volunteer coordinators, such as the 2017 Support Group Coordinator Forum.

During the year, our Member Services Officer, CEO and Management Committee members travel to meetings in metropolitan and regional areas for valuable face to face time with our Support Group network.

EDUCATION

Parkinson's Queensland provides education which aims to bring positive changes for people with Parkinson's through seminars, printed materials and over the phone support. These materials and seminars are provided not only to people living with Parkinson's, but carers, families, health care professionals and the community.

Educational highlights for the year were our well-attended *'in touch' seminar* in Ipswich, and our presence at the *Australian Pharmacy Professionals Conference*.

Parkinson's Queensland partnered with *MedicineX* and *Parkinson's Australia* during 2016-2017 to deliver the *Parkinson's Xplained* application to people living with or impacted by Parkinson's and health professionals alike.

AWARENESS

Improving the understanding of Parkinson's within the community is a priority. We promote Parkinson's awareness via the media and through fundraising initiatives, particularly during *Parkinson's Awareness Month* and *World Parkinson's Day*.



OUR HISTORY

In 1999, the first ever awareness concert event was held at Queensland University of Technology Concert Hall, titled "A Classical Afternoon," this annual concert event was continued until the mid-2000's.

Parkinson's Queensland employed two full time staff in 2002, these roles were that of Executive Officer and Administration Officer.

'IN TOUCH' SEMINAR

Parkinson's Queensland's 'Living with Parkinson's – A Holistic Approach,' forum in August at Ipswich was a success, with invited health professionals, members and guests all taking away an abundance of knowledge and new understanding about Parkinson's.

The health topics opened with *Karen O'Maley RN* (pictured, right, with *Victor McConvey RN*) addressing the Parkinson's Nurse Conundrum, she spoke in detail on the challenges faced with finding and training the right people, and acquiring the funding, for these increasingly important roles.

Professor George Mellick (pictured, right, with *Carol Bakker RN* and *Alison Fenton, physiotherapist*) and Neurologist *Professor Peter Silburn AM* joined forces in an engaging Q & A session that people with Parkinson's and health professionals alike found helpful. They spoke about the difficulty in finding the right diagnosis, and that symptoms of Parkinson's can sometimes present as symptoms of getting older. It is imperative to start medications for symptom relief when your diagnosis is clear and symptoms are bothering you, but that medication alone is not the full solution.

Our special guest from Victoria, *Victor McConvey RN*, spoke on the topic of 'Sex and Sexuality, as it pertains to Parkinson's'. He spoke about the need for intimacy, both physical and emotional, and the requirement for good quality communication between partners as couples adjust to the changes in the relationship after one has received a Parkinson's diagnosis.

The forum was well received by all in attendance. We welcome all with an interest in Parkinson's to join us at seminar sessions.

Parkinson's Queensland highly valued the opportunity to speak directly with pharmacists from all over Queensland, and Australia, and to provide them with valuable resources and knowledge.

Parkinson's Queensland held a *Support Group Coordinators' Forum* in March 2017. Recognising the importance of the Forum as a key component of the *Strategic Plan 2016-2020*.

The Strategic Plan 2016 - 2020 encourages the development of highly effective Support Groups ensuring the volunteer support group network will be a part of the Parkinson's Queensland structure, working together towards agreed strategic initiatives. In addition, it was agreed that Parkinson's Queensland would continue to invest in its people; we will have legal, governance and operational structures that support the development of our leaders to govern and management, staff and support groups to implement our agreed strategic initiatives.

Plans for the Forum were well received and through the greatest efforts of all support groups, 27 Coordinators or delegates from across Queensland joined together in Brisbane.

Parkinson's Queensland's President, *Professor George Mellick*, opened the Forum by welcoming all Coordinators or their delegates. *Mr Don Power* proceeded as the facilitator.

The Forum focused on being inclusive rather than prescriptive and the speakers of the Forum had a balance of involvement from the Management Committee, staff, Support Group Coordinators and Carers. The presentations provided, covered an array of topics including the Strategic Plan 2016-2020, the values of Parkinson's Queensland, finances, membership, support groups and volunteers. Whilst topics also centred around compliance, the risks and rewards and the different models of

support groups. The Chairman finished the first day by opening a discussion on the operations of the Management Committee, asking how can Parkinson's Queensland help support groups moving forward.

With the close of the first day of discussions, an opportunity was provided for the staff, Management Committee and coordinators to mingle and share stories and ideas over a group dinner. After dinner, *Julie McDonald OAM*, Olympian and Businesswoman, spoke about her deep connection to what it means to be a person affected by Parkinson's.

Given the chance to think over the presentations and discussion from day one of the Forum, all attendees came back together the following morning to have an open panel discussion.

FUNDING THE FUTURE



Research at Griffith University is striving to identify people susceptible to Parkinson's before they present with any symptoms.

Parkinson's Queensland is proud to be one of the funders of this important research and has provided a \$150,000 grant to the university for research into what precedes the disease.

This research is vital to improving existing treatments and to, one day, provide the ability to stop the disease before it takes hold.

At the Griffith Institute for Drug Discovery (GRIDD), Associate Professor Stephen Wood is working to find the root causes of Parkinson's by identifying people at various stages of the disease journey, independent of their symptoms.

Through the application of a cellular profiling tool called a probe panel, the research is validating disease biomarkers and leading towards better understanding of Parkinson's biology, earlier diagnosis and more targeted, personalised therapies.

With our ageing population tipped to double in the next 15 years fuelling a crisis of soaring healthcare services and costs, the need to alleviate the impact of Parkinson's is vital. Along with Parkinson's Queensland, funding for this project has come from Griffith University and the Aegium Foundation.

Parkinson's currently acts against all of these factors, but Associate Professor Wood is buoyed by the progress and implications of the research.

"In Parkinson's, there is a wide range of symptoms beyond the most obvious, such as the familiar tremor," he says. "However, there are no really good biomarkers for either people at risk of the disease or those who don't present with the classic symptoms.

"What this means is that by the time someone is diagnosed, they have already lost more than 50 per cent of their nerve cells in the brain region controlling movement and you can't reverse that. By using the probe panel, we are working towards validating biomarkers that can predict an individual's likelihood of contracting Parkinson's."

The probe panel is a set of molecules that tests functional and dysfunctional cellular responses, in this case using olfactory mucosa cells from people with

Parkinson's and a control group of healthy individuals. With certain cell compartments implicated in Parkinson's – such as the mitochondria and lysosome – exposure to these compounds stresses the cell and creates responses that can be analysed to determine genetic predisposition or external triggers, including environmental factors.



Close to 1000 molecular compounds have already been screened and, while the work is comprehensive and ongoing, Associate Professor Wood is encouraged by the results. "Cells are complex little machines that truly reflect the individual," he says.

"In this research, we're looking for the compound that tells us why you, the individual, have Parkinson's. The pathway of disruption appears to be different for different people and we want to learn how and why."

"For example, we want to engage with families affected by Parkinson's, take biopsies before any clinical signs materialise, and see if the disease is individually predictive. It's about identifying the pathways of disruption."

"We've already clearly identified differences between people with Parkinson's and the healthy control group. We know that when exposed to compounds that induce cellular stress, the cells from Parkinson's patients die more readily."

"The funding from Parkinson's Queensland is crucial to further exploration and discovery, taking us ever closer to clinical trials and then on to more effective treatments and therapies for this terrible disease."



Parkinson's Queensland recorded its 30th Year of service as an incorporated association in 2015.

In 2016 Parkinson's Queensland joined forces with other neurological charities to form the SPARK Neurocare Network and, together with Parkinson's Australia, began to campaign government to "Make Parkinson's A Priority."



TREASURER'S REPORT



I am pleased to present this year's financial report and audited accounts to Members.

Last year, I reported on a period of consolidation of Parkinson's Queensland's accounting and reporting systems which enabled Members to see more clearly the financial position of

their association and how funds have been applied. The systems incorporated have and continue to serve us well.

Parkinson's Queensland continues to grow financially and its oversight through the Management Committee has demonstrated a strong equity base and liquidity position. As can be seen from the accompanying unqualified audit report members can see the organisation is solvent and able to pay its obligations as they fall due.

In summary, the main indicators of our successful financial management and reporting are demonstrated through the following information, noting there are two reporting entities; Parkinson's Queensland Inc and Parkinson's Queensland Research Fund.

Parkinson's Queensland Inc

• Profit and Loss:

The picture shows of a year of consolidation, growth and continuing strength within service delivery.

- o **Income** while sound at \$659,061 continues to reflect reliance, albeit diminishing, on government grants. While Parkinson's Queensland will always seek increased funding from Government agencies it has already taken steps increase its levels of Philanthropic support as well as diversification of sources of income.
- o **Bequest** income will always be a base for activities and will be encouraged as estates mature.
- o **Expenses** at \$579,490 are in keeping with operational plans and are closely monitored within budgetary approvals by the Management Committee.
- o The **Surplus** at \$87,473 is a significant result given the implementation of appropriate accrual measures with retentions appropriate within plans and reflects an improvement of \$130,277 over 2016.

Parkinson's Queensland Research Fund

The Fund is strong with all funds held on term deposit with our bankers are considered safe and accessible to distribute on research related activities as the organisation moves forward.

Parkinson's Queensland is in a strong financial position with significant cash reserves. The reporting measures

implemented to enable Management Committee members to make sound decisions on expenditure and collaborations are strong. I would particularly like to acknowledge the close operational relationship Parkinson's Queensland has with its Accountants, *Davies, Knox Maynards*, and Auditors *George and Ridgway*. While some may consider our levels of reporting to be a little excessive to requirements they have served your organisation well and will be continued.

As part of the Agenda for the is the appointment of our Auditors *George and Ridgway* for another year. The principal, *Mr Thomas George CPA*, is agreeable to his firm continuing as our Auditors. I strongly endorse that motion.

I would like to acknowledge the strong support and commitment of Parkinson's Queensland's staff to maintaining a strong and financially vibrant organisation and thank them.

This report and the Audited Financial Report are commended to the Members for adoption.



NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 1 – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 1981 (Qld). The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historic costs and does not take into account changing money values, or except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report.

(a) Income Tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as Parkinson's Queensland Incorporated operates solely as a non-profit association established for the provision of community services and accordingly it is exempt from income tax under section 50-45 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

(b) Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)

Leasehold improvements and office equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciable amount of all PPE is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

Leasehold improvements are amortised over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

(c) Impairment of Assets

At the end of each reporting period, the entity reviews the carrying values of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is recognised in the income and expenditure statement.

(d) Employee Benefits

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee benefits have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

(e) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less

NOTE 1 – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONT.)

(f) Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising revenue.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest rate method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument.

Grant and donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

(g) Good and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the Assets and Liabilities Statement are shown inclusive of GST.


